EXECUTIVE SUMMARY



The African Drum and Dance Parent Association (ADDPA) Board of Directors and Staff developed this strategic plan with assistance from Pamela Hawkins, Principal Consultant (The Agnuwell Marketing Group). It provides ADDPA with a five-year guide for supports, services and organizational development. The Board of Directors and staff will review the progress of the plan quarterly. In addition we will review and update the plan annually as needed.

Board Members and Staff were significantly involved in the process of developing this Strategic Plan. In addition, volunteers, parents, artists, and community advocates submitted ideas. Participants met monthly beginning April 2022 (concluding September 2022) to brainstorm various issues and were assigned "homework" to further investigate the issues discussed. Staff and Board of Directors compiled the data to produce the final document.

ORGANIZATIONAL HISTORY



With no formal training, the African Drum & Dance Parent Association's (ADDPA) founder, Kevin Collins, became interested in drumming at an early age where he used his mother's pots and pans as drums. While attending Flint Public Schools, he mastered his already distinguished percussion skills. After graduating from Flint Northern High School, Kevin began touring with such musical legends as: Ronnie Laws, Allan Barnes, Jack McDuff, Roy Ayers, Eddie Harris, Leon Thomas Wendell Harris, Richard "Groove" Holmes, Jimmy Smith, Marcus Bell Graves, Sule Greg Wilson, The Willie George Big Band and Reverend James Cleveland. Kevin's musical spectrum includes all forms of music, Jazz, Blues, Big Band, Latin and Caribbean Styling.

As Kevin continued to pursue his musical career and dreams, he began to embark on a new focus: that of the African, Caribbean, and Cuban Drums. To enhance his skills, Mr. Collins was mentored by Drumming Gurus in Mali and New Guinea, Africa. His passion and experience overflows to all ages of audiences. Kevin's energy, enthusiasm and sense of community are what drove him to share and teach his expertise to all that are interested. He believes in the African proverb, "It Takes a Village to Raise a Child". In the 1980s, as music programs began to fade from public schools, Baba Collins, as he is affectionately called, noticed children were lacking listening skills and showing poor academic performance. With the encouragement of Cathy Johnson, Barbara Banks, and Jan Murdock Hartranft (all members of the local art community) formal drumming classes were scheduled in the Flint Community Schools. In addition, Outreach Programs were held at the Haskell and Christ Enrichment Community Centers. The first concert was held at Christ Enrichment Center.

ORGANIZATIONAL HISTORY (CONT.)



Relationships with prominent benefactors were nurtured. Mrs. Ruth Mott invited ADDPA Drum Corps to Applewood, fed them lunch, and engaged in an impromptu "concert" with them. The Avery Boone family provided supplies in the early years.

African Dance was added in the 1990s. "Mama" Jewellyne Richardson and others assisted in the choreography and discipline of the Kuungana Dance Troupe. Mama Jewel is still involved with the dancers and chairs ADDPA's Board. Today African Dancing is part of the repertoire of ADDPA Drumming Performances.

Through the years, ADDPA has expanded offering workshops and classes throughout Michigan. School Districts that have contracted the organization to schedule classes have been Flint Community Schools, Genesee Intermediate School District, Kalamazoo, Saginaw Public Schools, Grand Rapids, Detroit Public Schools and Pontiac Public Schools. Other cities and counties have included Midland, Lapeer, Port Huron, Alpena, Cadillac, Petoskey, Boyne City, Mackinaw City, and Mackinaw Island. Activities included classes, workshops, and concerts. Mr. Collins has taught a very diverse population that has included African American, Arab, Latino, Native American, Polish, children of European descent, and those with disabilities.

During the COVID Pandemic, ADDPA had to become creative in offering programs. Classes were taught through Zoom, home items (e.g. buckets, pots, pans, utensils) were used since the African Drums were not available. This also opened opportunities to offer programs Internationally with West African gurus.

Highlights of the organization have included the drum corps performing before Ambassador Jean Kennedy Smith at the Smithsonian Institute, VSA International Festivals (Mexico City, California, and Washington DC), Michigan Youth Arts Festival, and Kevin Collins named VSA Michigan's 2010 Educator






